MEDICINAL PLANTS OF INDIA, Vol.1 — Published by Indian Council of Medical Research New Delhi, Price Rs. 30/-

I.C.M.R., members of the Advisory Committee and Editors, associated with the job bringing out this publication deserve encomiums for doing a magnificient job. Chopra's Indigen ous Drugs of India and Nadkarni's Indian Materia Medica written several years ago provided ver useful reference material for workers interested in research on medicinal plants. However over the last 15 years, an enormous amount of literature has accumulated on med cinal plants. Those not keeping pace with research in this area or new entrants in this field, would be completely lost looking for the material in the journals of Botany, Chemistry, Pharmacolog Pharmacy, Medicine, Ayurveda, Unani etc. Medicinal Plants of India has therefore filled the gap. 350 plants have been described alphabetically (A to G) in relation to their botanical, chem cal and clinical properties. Plants already well established and dealt with at length in text book and pharmacoepias are not incorporated in the monograph. Ayurvedic description (whereever available) as given in the ancient texts is also included. Two appendices, one giving list of plan classified according to activity and the other giving glossary of Sanskrit/Ayurvedic terms at additional welcome features of the monograph. Description on each plant is immediately follow ed by a list of references. About 75 plants bear illustrations which are well-made. Finally the book is priced reasonably. For those interested in medicinal plants the monograph is a gold min of information and we fervently hope that Vol. II would follow soon. The book is strong recommended for the shelves of interested libraries.
